LOOK, LISTEN, AND ASK



Tips for Choosing Quality Before-School and Afterschool Care

Use this tip sheet as a guide when you visit to help you look at, listen for, and ask about key features of a quality program. Please note that because of the current pandemic, some programs may not be able to offer in-person tours or program visits at this time. In this case, you should discuss virtual tour options with programs you are considering.



- Look at the building, classroom space, materials, and equipment. Are they clean and in good repair?
- Look at the space where the children will be spending their time. Is it inviting and appropriate for schoolagers? Would your child like to be there?
- Look to see if the spaces are well organized and materials are easily accessible. Are there a variety of materials and spaces for school-agers (such as arts and crafts, dramatic play, games, physical activities, computers, reading area, areas to relax)?
- Look at the program schedule. Is there a mix of activities planned (indoor and outdoor, alone and small and large groups, active and quiet, and staffdirected and child-initiated activities)? Is there time for children to relax and just "hang out"?
- Look at the outdoor area and play equipment. Does it look appropriate for school-age children?



- Listen to how staff are interacting with the children. You should hear a calm, positive tone of voice at an appropriate volume level.
- Listen to the sounds you hear while visiting the program. Do you hear frequent laughter and conversations? Do you hear children playing?
- Notice the smells while you are visiting the program. Are they clean, pleasant smells or do you notice strong unpleasant odors?

Ask ?

- Ask if the program is licensed or accredited.
- Ask for a copy of the program's policies.
 Review important information on philosophy,
 billing, payments, drop-off/pick-up procedures,
 discipline and guidance policy, closures, etc.
- Ask if the program provides transportation for children to and from school. Is there is an additional cost for this service? How are children supervised during transport? Is a safe and reliable vehicle used? Is the driver licensed and insured? Are children properly restrained?
- Ask about the program's sick child policy?
 How does it handle children who become sick
 onsite?
- Ask how the program handles giving children **medication while in care**, if applicable.
- Ask how children are grouped (ages, grades). Are separate areas of the building used for different ages and interests? Is there mixing of age groups?
- Ask what the adult to child ratio is (how many children each adult must supervise).
- Ask how the program supports children in completing their homework. Is there a designated time or space for completing homework?
- Ask how the program handles challenging behaviors. How does it resolve conflict between children?
- Ask if they provide **meals and snacks**.
- Ask about the education and training requirements for program staff. Do they participate in continuing education? Are staff specifically trained to work with school-age children?
- Ask how the program keeps families informed about things happening in the program.
- Ask if the program accepts child care assistance payments or offers a sliding fee, discounts, or scholarships, if applicable.
- If your child has a disability, ask how the program would support your child throughout the day. Ask if staff received training on how to support children with disabilities.
